The College has two campuses, at 54 and 75 Rose Street, Mile End. The Junior Campus has students from Play Group to Year 4 while the Senior Campus accommodates students from Years 5 to 12.

Established in 1983, St George College is the first Orthodox College in South Australia. In 1984, there were 31 students across Years 1 to 3 in attendance at the College – a small, humble beginning built on the Christian virtues modelled by Saint George. Our College was established to:

- Ensure the effective teaching and learning of the Orthodox Faith and the Modern Greek language

BUILDING MASTERPLAN

PARENTS AND FRIENDS COMMITTEE

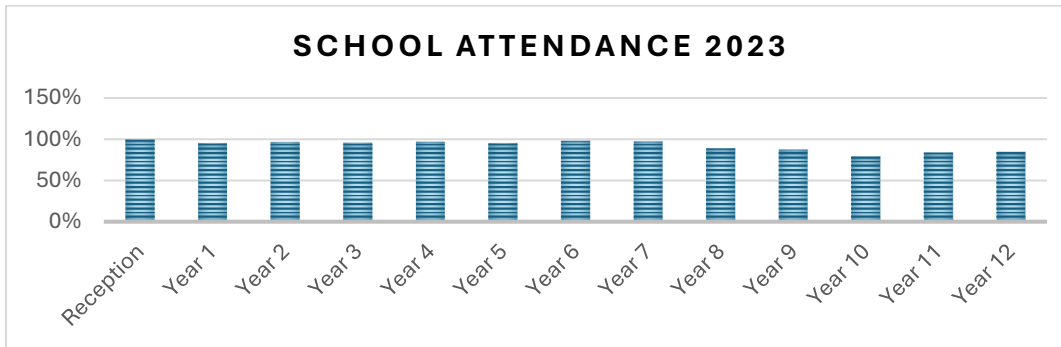
The Parents and Friends Committee plays a vital role in building and promoting a sense of community with the parents, friends, students and staff of our College, whilst fund raising through various activities.

We trust they are excited about the next stage of their journey and that the College has played a significant role in getting them prepared.

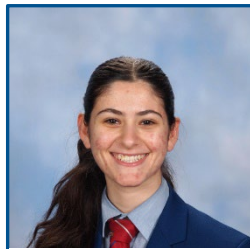

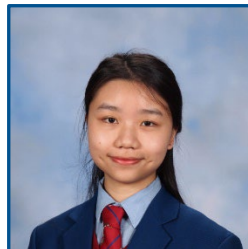

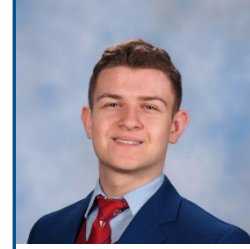
